Message From the Pastor

Four Weddings and a Funeral

In our family this year, we have celebrated four weddings and mourned the death of our nephew, Adam. As the final wedding wraps up, I reflect on these big life events. Joy and sorrow are both present at the same time. In the last year of Fort Hill church, we have been blessed by the excellent generosity and hard work that allows our renovation to happen. At the same time our ministries continue to live out our mission in old and new ways. But with decisions made by the General Assembly or other circumstances, some of our members have been missing from our community or left altogether. I find myself grieving people I have grown to care for and love as part of our flock. It feels much like a divorce which is ironic considering one of the issues is the blessing and gift of marriage — unity, covenant, and commitment. Joy and sorrow, gains and loss, they seem to go hand in hand.

As Matt and Emily made their covenant promises this last weekend, I read from Matthew 7 where Jesus describes the house built on sand and rock. The house built on sand crashes when the winds blow. The one built on the rock lasts. It is the one built on faith in God in Jesus Christ. When Chuck and I were married, niece Emily, then five years old and future high jump champion, climbed up on the church railing where the flowers were placed. She knocked off the plate glass meant to protect the wood. Crash! Right in the middle of our vows!

Interestingly, right before Matt and Emily's wedding began, the glass sign at the entrance was blown over by a small wisp of wind. Crash! As we prepared to walk towards the cross they had erected in this field, the groomsmen were frantically picking up the broken pieces of glass. In a Jewish wedding a glass is usually broken to remind the gathered people that in the midst of joy, there is also sorrow. Prophetically, we were well aware at this gathering that some important people were missing because of death, and that marriage is filled with joy and sorrow, plenty and want, sickness and health. Matt's grandfather, interestingly, was Jewish. Matt and Emily talked about ways to include that part of Matt's heritage in the wedding ceremony. It seems that God worked that out!

In marriage we bind ourselves to one another through promises. For Christians of the Presbyterian flavor, we call marriage a covenant, not a sacrament as it was not instituted by Jesus as was baptism and the Lord's supper. We are making promises and going on faith, asking God to help us keep them. Glass breaks, loved ones get sick and even die, life brings challenges, our covenants help us navigate these things together. Storms come, rains fall, and the wind blows, but life of faithful discipleship and covenant built on Jesus will stand the test of time. We are better together. In the end, life is never without troubles, it is a matter of faithful following and trust.

The other scripture shared with Matt and Emily was Proverbs 3:3-6. May these words guide our walk together in Christ, our companion, Lord, friend, and savior. He who suffered persecution and death, overcame death with victory and new life! In Him we hope.

³Do not let loyalty and faithfulness forsake you; bind them around your neck, write them on the tablet of your heart. ⁴So you will find favor and good repute in the sight of God and of people. ⁵Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not rely on your own insight. ⁶In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths.

Reforming the General Assembly, Presbyterian Church (USA)

Below is a summary of the work we have been doing in our Presbytery to Reform General Assembly process. Here is Gordon's introduction to an upcoming article to be published in the Presbyterian Outlook magazine.

Laura Smith Conrad, Moderator and Pastor

A Word from the Stated Clerk, the Rev. Gordon Raynal, Foothills Presbytery

After returning from the Presbyterian Leadership Formation Residency in May 2014, I shared the conversations we had about reforming General Assembly with a number of colleagues in Foothills Presbytery. In the aftermath of General Assembly and the stir that had been aroused by the GA votes on marriage, divestment, and other divisive topics; a group of Ruling and Teaching Elders gathered at Fourth Presbyterian Church in Greenville to talk about taking of the challenge of reform, but also modernization of how we can best and most faithfully be Presbyterian Christians in the 21st Century context. From these earlier conversations and from this gathering Foothills formed The Foothills Presbytery General Assembly Reform Group. From the outset of the work we talked about the need to engage the whole Church at every level. To do this we created a national mailing list of the Executives and Stated Clerks of all 171 Presbyteries, 16 Synods, the Moderator and key leaders in the Office of the General Assembly to share our work, to create dialogue and to seek input to craft a set of GA overtures intended to begin the necessary sustained process to truly reform, refresh and renew our polity and our relationships. And individual members of the GA Reform Group shared the work over the last months. To date six other Presbyteries have docketed putting forward the 8 Overtures approved by Foothills at the August 9, 2015 meeting. The Office of the General Assembly has invited us to make a presentation at the Fall Polity Conference in Portland, Oregon in October. It is our hope that many more Presbyteries will endorse our work and help the PC(USA) truly engage in a season of reform.

Kelly Roman, Associate Pastor for University Ministry

I became Fort Hill's Associate Pastor for University Ministry in October 2013. This is my first experience living in South Carolina, having spent the majority of my life in central New Jersey. I left my home state to attend college at the University of Richmond and returned for graduate school at Princeton Theological Seminary. In my free time, I enjoy traveling, reading, photography, and hiking. Since moving to South Carolina, I have enjoyed taking pictures of beautiful waterfalls. This month, I am looking forward to a trip to Healdsburg, California, where I will attend an ecumenical conference on Christian Education called Pneuma.

News from Family Promise of Pickens Co.

Family Promise of Pickens County recently celebrated its one-year anniversary since it hosted its first guests at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Clemson on August 26, 2014. Family Promise is a national organization with over 200 chapters throughout the USA that has operated for over 30 years to give homeless families a hand up to affordable housing and a stable living environment. In Pickens County this last year, we have served 11 families totaling 35 people including 11 adults and 24 children. Six families have successfully transitioned out of the program, three have gone to neighboring counties and three remain in Pickens County. Program participants have received assistance and services in the form of Intensive Case Management, daily shelter and meals from 14 host and 4 support congregations, financial management classes for parents, tutoring for children, summer enrichment programs for children, babysitting, transportation, clothing, referrals to other services, assistance in seeking employment and finding housing and much more. This is the only program for homeless families in Pickens County where there are 1,943 homeless children identified by the Pickens County School District.. The need is great and Fort Hill Presbyterian Church is one of the host churches.

Family Promise of Pickens County will host its first major fundraiser October 23-24 in Gateway Park, Clemson just off of Highway 93. The project is called Cardboard Box City and will raise attention to homelessness by sleeping in a large cardboard box so someone else won't have to. For \$500 donation to be raised by the participant, a group or individual can rent a 10'x10' space in the park, place up to 6 large cardboard boxes there and sleep overnight from 9 pm October 23 to 6 am October 24. Meals on Wheels will provide a soup dinner. More details are available from Event Leader, Tom von Kaenel, tom.vonkaenel@yahoo.com, 864-643-9197. Linda Gahan at Fort Hill will also answer your questions about the project. Our Christian Action Ministry has donated \$500 and now we need to recruit a small team to complete this project. Sponsorships are also welcomed.

Camp Buc Fundraising Effort

For years the Buc Outdoor Center has been a place where children, youth, college students and adults have met God in the wilderness of the NC mountains. Our Presbytery Camp situated in Sapphire, NC has been a gift to all who have visited there. With reductions in giving to the Foothills Presbytery, the Presbytery can no longer support the ministry which has had large overages beyond the budget on an ongoing basis. With the hopes of transitioning to a 503(c) non-profit to find more sources of funding, the board of Buc Outdoor Center has made hard decisions. Through August, total income was \$614,366 while expenses for the first 8 months were \$543,694 for a surplus of \$71,383.76. Overall expenses are at 58.5% of budget, while income is at 66.1%.
