Message From the Pastor

God Is Our Guardian and Guide

GoD's your Guardian...He guards you when you leave and when you return, he guards you now, he guards you always. Psalm 121:5, 7-8 from The Message

I have a friend whose family recited Psalm 121 every time they took a road trip to remind them that God would guide and protect them from here to there. Psalm 121 is sometimes called the Traveler's Psalm. You may recall the opening words, "I lift my eyes to the hills. From where does my help come? My help comes from the LORD, maker of heaven and earth."

I ponder these words as I prepare to go on a journey this summer, a Sabbatical. Many of you are taking journeys, too...the literal kind, trips to see family, mission trips, weekend jaunts. Or more the figurative types, journeys with a loved one through illness, moving from childhood to adulthood and through the chaos of adolescence, or into retirement while living in the same place. We are always on a journey of faith...of revelation, doubt, struggle, new insight, deeper trust in God.

Some things I have learned about journeys. We need companions and a Guide. We need the Church of Jesus Christ, because faith is not a solo act, but an ensemble, and God is the ever-present hum made by a symphony of creation and people lost in wonder, love, and praise. We have guides, most importantly, the Triune God, but our other guides include Scripture, the Body of Christ, and our Theology/Confessions. Other false guides will try to lead us — hucksters selling the latest adventure, entertainment, or high. But what is true and real is the LORD who made the heavens and earth.

While I am away on Sabbatical (starting June 4), I will be on a journey, a pilgrimage. Sabbaticals for pastors are not a chance to write a dissertation, or seek a new call, or an extended vacation. Sabbaticals are extended Sabbath gifts of time to enjoy God, be with people whom you love, and enjoy the good gifts of creation. Sabbath time is a time to "lie fallow" as the fields did every seventh year in Scripture as a way for the land to rest, renew, rejoice in God. At times, I will have companions like my best soul friends and family, but also books, strangers, surprises and the time to notice them. Other times I will journey alone like when I arrive in Iona, Scotland, a remote island in the Hebrides, but I know time alone is still time with God, our guardian and guide, and worship wherever I may be. Our true home is in our ever-present God.

I will be away from you which means not knowing your joys and sorrows or sharing a meal. Practically, I will turn off email and social media — except that Chuck, and kids may still be active. I will mostly be away from home, but there will be times I am in town, and we will bump into one another in the grocery store or gym. I will be glad to see your face, but know we need to not visit to be true to the Sabbatical. So please help me with that, too. I know that God will guard you as you go and come, too. I look forward to being reunited in person in September. And we trust one another to God's good providence in the meantime...

Mission El Faro Fundraising Project Proposal for June 2018 Mission Trip

Help Fund an Expanded "Mother's Room at the National Children's Hospital (NCH) Puerto Barrios, Guatemala

We invite you to support the Mision El Faro Mother's Room Fundraising Project, by participating in the "100 Envelopes" drive to raise money for Fort Hill's June 2018 intergenerational service mission trip.

Beth Chapman, FH's El Faro group leader for the past several years, recently received an email from Tommy Matthews (our missionary contact at El Faro), reporting the Chiquita Banana company is building a new neo-natal ward with 11 beds on NCH's grounds. This means Fort Hill can also help provide beds for 11 more Moms. This welcome addition to the existing Mother's Room (see "history" below), with its two new showers and toilet, will cost about \$9,000, it doubles the size of the current ward. We would LOVE for this expansion to be our project focus for Fort Hill's Service Mission team in June. Other small projects will not incur a cost, or cost just a small amount (Beth will contact Tommy about those projects soon).

Fort Hill's first Service Mission trip to Mision El Faro, Guatemala, was in October 2015. The team included: Laura Conrad, Stacey Miller, Bob & Susan Brown, and Beth Chapman. The team's priority was to transform a dismal storage area at NCH into a "Ronald McDonald" type room for mothers of infants in the hospital's neo-natal unit. Moms needed to be much closer to their babies to nurse and better bond with them. Previously, they had endured sitting for hours on end, in hard, straight-backed chairs to meet their baby's needs, and the only place they had to sleep was outside on the streets. Such a room was desperately needed by these dedicated, loving women.

Fort Hill's first team cleaned the storage room and courtyard located behind this room. They hauled trash, built and painted new walls, installed electrical outlets, built doors, scrubbed floors and proved money for tiles used to re-tile two showers and a toileting area in the room (tiling was done by a subsequent team after our team left). They re-made 12 (re-furbished) beds with new bedding, and painted flowers and Bible verses on the new walls, there are even several tiger paws around the room. ©





Fort Hill's next trip was in April 2016. Our team was comprised of four ladies and one of the primary projects was to build new benches and tables for the evolving Mother's Room. The team also painted the outside walls around the courtyard, painted the large sink in that area, and installed a new clothesline.

Fort Hill's next trip was in February 2017. This team was to focus on a medical mission, rather than complete any service projects. Unfortunately, due to unanticipated issues with the medical instruments needed, the team was unable to perform the planned eye surgeries. In spite of having no scheduled service projects, the team still visited the Mother's Room and found every bed occupied — the new Mother's Room was obviously a rich blessing for so many mothers.

In July 2017 a Fort Hill team of 13 returned again to Mision El Faro.

Although they had no scheduled projects in

NCH's Mother's Room, for three full days members sanded and painted walls, replaced stained, soiled ceiling tiles, and painted Disney and other fun figures on the walls of a heavily used children's ward.

Fort Hill is forever connected to the NCH through our many hours of loving labor, and having left part of our hearts there too. The Mother's Room concept has been "our baby", since its rebirth from being a storage area ("Fort Hill Presbyterian Church" is painted on a wall in the common area of the new Mother's Room).

We hope you see the need for the new addition, and how FHPC has been a part of this Mother's Room since the beginning. We pray to be the ones now to help build the expanded facility and further meet the needs of these loving mothers.

A Really Heart-Felt Thank You

Dear Fort Hill,

Back in 1997, Fort Hill Medical Mission was born, and since that time 44 mission trips have been made to 13 countries. The purpose was to take Fort Hill's love to people caught in poverty who were suffering needlessly from advanced eye disease. This effort would have been dead in the water without the support of Fort Hill which began immediately and never ended. That support was emotional, spiritual, and financial. Whatever was needed in the way of supplies and equipment was provided. Thousands of people received love, hugs, and surgery. The great impact is that we and all those who traveled with us were the ones most blessed. Fort Hill has friends from the Tibetan border to the rice patties of Vietnam and the mountains of Haiti and the lakes of Rwanda and the temples of India.

It is with deep gratitude that Susan and I now make our own gift to Fort Hill's outreach mission. This gift is to say thank you, and it is also, in a special way, given as a challenge grant. We are asking Fort Hill to join us in helping fund a much-needed enlargement of the Mother's Room at the Children's Hospital in Puerto Barrios, Guatemala. The initial creation of this room came from Fort Hill's El Faro team of October 2015, and we happily consider it Fort Hill's baby. Everyone who has been to El Faro and to the Children's Hospital has fallen in love with the people, and our alumni group will double with the 30 going in June on the intergenerational mission team. Susan and I can see that large team working at the Mother's Room and at other locations around El Faro and in turn being blessed by the love of those wonderful people.

So, as we donate our \$5,000, we ask Fort Hill to meet the challenge of matching that amount. We have every confidence that you will. You see, every dollar you give becomes two, and the Mission Outreach committee has a fun way for you to make your donations. It is simply called "One Hundred Envelopes". Remember, it is all for the mothers and their very little ones at THE children's hospital for the poor in Guatemala. Just know we love you all and appreciate you from the bottom of our hearts.

The Guide to Preparing a Witness to the Resurrection

People are generally fascinated with death, not their own, but that of others. Facing death can be challenging, but as Christians we can face death with hope because of the resurrection. For many, death is not to be feared but the process of dying is what people fear. For Christians, death simply is part of the process of living and we believe that eternal life can happen now, even before we die physically. In theology we call this the "already and not yet" of eternal life. Jesus speaks to Martha, the sister of Lazarus, in John chapter 11 about this kind of eternal life when he says,

"I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?"

She said to him, "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world."

In the same way that Jesus tells Martha he *already is* the resurrection, and also the *one coming into* the world, we too are *already* saved by the work of Jesus Christ on the cross and able to experience eternal life now as well as *in the life to come*.

One of the best ways to face death is to talk about it and thinking through what one would prefer for his or her final memorial. *The Guide to Preparing a Witness to the Resurrection* form (available in the Narthex, the FHOG office, the Fort Hill Church website, or by calling Judy in the church office — 654-2061) can help individuals and families have that conversation, no matter what your age. As a pastor, I have found that thinking ahead and putting one's desires about such things in writing is a gift to the family in a time of grief. Making decisions without having had such conversations can be difficult and even conflicting for some family members. To *already* have thought about *the not yet*, prevents the potential for additional grief during an already difficult time for most families.

Your pastors, session, and diaconate, appreciate you taking the time to work through this guide and make what decisions you can at this point in your lives. For some it is a document to begin and file at the church and home and come back to at a later date. For others it is timely and helpful to begin thinking about what may be on the horizon or the sunset. If you would like a pastor to speak with you about any questions you may have, please do not hesitate to contact one of us. We are here for you and welcome your questions and conversations.

First time users will be required to enter their email account again and create an account or continue as a guest (Screen Shot #4). Follow directions to choose a credit or debit card and enter the required account information (Screen Shot #5). If you chose to set up an account, the next time you visit, you only need to enter the amount, choose the fund, and enter the email address and password you created previously. The program remembers the account information, so you will not have to enter it again. Remember this is a secure site.
