The new tax law did do away with donations to organizations like IPTAY that set the priority for tickets by the amount given to the organization.

Contributions to organizations like our beloved church are still deductible if you itemize. Granted that the new tax law also just about doubled the standard deduction, many may no longer itemize.

Does this mean we no longer should support our Church? If the only reason you gave was because of deductions, well, you need to think again. We give to our Church because it is what Our Lord expects of us in light of his saving Grace. Not that we are buying Grace, of course not. It is our response to his gift of Grace. Our gifts keep the lights on for us, AA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and many other organizations that call Fort Hill home. It is how many of us support other organizations such as the Clemson Child Development Center, Clemson Free Clinic, and others. It is how we support Sunday School and PSA, spreading the teachings of Christ to those who like me need to keep hearing Christ's words.

Finance Ministry Update

Dear Fort Hill Friends,

With your help and support we completed our renovation project that improved accessibility throughout our church building and significantly improved our education facilities. The church looks great! Our building fund campaign continues to receive pledges and contributions. To date we anticipate our pledged giving will complete \$301,905 toward the current outstanding loan balance of \$701,748. However, this leaves an unfunded amount on our loan that approximates \$400,000. We ask that you prayerfully consider continuing to contribute to the building fund if you completed your pledge or begin contributing if you have not done so. If all who helped would continue giving, we could avoid having to restructure our loan in the future, and avoid paying additional interest. Thank you for your support of our ministry at Fort Hill.

Local Service Mission Opportunities

Over the years, Fort Hill Presbyterian Church has partnered with a number of local organizations to assist in meeting community needs. That support has involved financial program support, but it has also involved some significant volunteer time on the part of a number of Fort Hill members. While we will continue financial support, we would like to broaden our volunteer support making church members aware of opportunities to contribute in a meaningful way. A priority for Christian Action Ministry this year is work with current and new community partners to identify and prioritize needs and to find opportunities for groups or individuals to participate. The June and July issues of *The Window* are highlighting some of the local organizations with whom we are partnering.



Mission Statement: Seeking to put God's love into action, Habitat for Humanity brings people together to build homes, communities and hope.

Habitat for Humanity was founded in Americus, GA in 1976. Since that time, Habitat has built, renovated, and repaired more than 600,000 homes sheltering 3 million people worldwide. The Pickens County Chapter is the second oldest chapter in South Carolina and the 12th oldest in the U.S. Over 100 houses have been built or renovated in Pickens County through PCHFH.

Churches, Other community groups, and individuals donate toward building materials. Volunteers at all skill levels then take over providing the labor to construct the building. The term "all skill level" means that — if you can hammer nails or do basic tasks, you are welcome. A number of FHPC members have participated over the years including John Sherman who has worked with PCHFH for 16 years. You can show up at the work site individually, although we would like to organize a small group of volunteers from the church who may want to work together on projects. We are currently targeting Friday and Saturday workdays beginning this summer. In time, it might be nice to team with other Clemson churches to partner on local projects. An informational meeting is scheduled for **Sunday, June 3 after the 10:45 service in the Club Room**, and more information on the Pickens County Habitat for Humanity is available online at <http://pickenshabitat.org>.

Mission Statement: To partner businesses, churches, community groups, and civic organizations with elementary, middle and high school students in Pickens County to provide them with a framework of support to help them achieve their potential and discover their strengths.

The YMCA has introduced a topnotch mentoring program to the area. The program, originally launched in 2015 in the Easley Area schools, expanded in 2016-2018 to phase in all 24 schools in Pickens County. The need is great, and growth of the

program continues, most recently to include 14 schools in Anderson School District One. Evolving from a handful of people wanting to make a difference in the lives of children, the program now has 225 approved mentors in Pickens County alone. Recruitment continues year-round as there are students on waiting lists at every school who are in need of a caring, encouraging adult to come into their life and become their friend, advocate, their mentor!

The belief of the Y-Mentor Program is that, "change happens through one-on-one relationships." Anyone interested in mentoring can register to attend Mentoring 101, a 2-hour training course in a classroom setting, before evaluating next steps. The biggest thing the Y-Mentor Program asks of its mentors is commitment. New mentors are asked to make a 1-year commitment of 30 minutes per week with a student while they are at school. The hope is that the mentor will renew that commitment to follow along with your child/teen through high school. There is an additional, optional layer of the program, called Outside Mentoring, which allows a mentor to meet with or interact with their mentee away from school.

As an advocate, guide, advisor, confidant, encourager, listener and friend, mentors are a positive influence and catalyst in helping shape the future of our community. Mission Statement: Our Daily Bread is an interdenominational Christian ministry committed to addressing the needs of the poor and underserved. We will provide daily, nourishing meals in a pleasant, friendly setting designed both to alleviate physical hunger, as well as provide an encouraging and supportive environment to enable hope. We also provide informational support to help our guests find ways to solve the problems that aggravate their individual situation.

Our Daily Bread started with "Feed the 5000" in 1992 serving bag lunches. The program started to serve meals 5 days per week in 1996 and in 1997 became a 501c(3) charity. In 2001, Our Daily Bread identified needs and built, without incurring debt, the current facility at 106 Jordan Street in Seneca. Our Daily Bread is listed with SC Charities and Non-Profits and is blessed with a dedicated all-volunteer organization. Recent economic challenges have increased the need and volume of those we serve, yet, the caring community we are privileged to be part of, has continued to support Our Daily Bread in volunteerism and donations. Our Daily Bread serves approximately 130 meals Monday—Friday. On Saturday and Sunday other groups use the kitchen to provide meals to serve the community. Fort Hill Presbyterian Church provides volunteers on the 2nd Friday of each month.
