
The Seminary at the Fort

most widely disputed and least clearly


understood books in history.

Toxic Charity: How Churches and Charities Hurt Those They Help, And How to Reverse It by Robert D. Lupton



Surprised by Hope: Rethinking Heaven, the Resurrection, and the Mission of the Church by N. T. Wright published by HarperCollins.



Making Sense of The Bible: Rediscovering the Power of Scripture Today by Adam Hamilton published by HarperOne.

Join the Seekers class as they explore *Making Sense of The Bible* through a DVD study. Denominations from evangelical to mainline continue to experience deep divisions over universal social issues. The underlying debate isn't about a particular social issue, but instead it is about how we understand the nature of scripture and how we should interpret it. In *Making Sense of the Bible*, Adam Hamilton, one of the country's leading pastors and Christian authors, addresses the hot-button issues that plague the church and cultural debate, and answers many of the questions frequently asked by Christians and non-Christians alike.



Why would Paul command women to "keep silent in the church?" Were Adam and Eve real people? Is the book of Revelation really about the end times? In approachable and inviting language, Hamilton addresses these often misunderstood biblical themes leading readers to a deeper appreciation of the Bible so that we might hear God speak through it and find its words to be life-changing and life-giving.







Jesus, the Bible, and Homosexuality by Jack Rogers, published by Westminster John Knox Press.

Rev. Rogers served as the 213th Moderator of the GA of the PC(USA) and is professor emeritus of theology at San Francisco Theological Seminary. He also taught philosophical theology at Fuller Theological Seminary and is a foremost scholar in the confessions of the church.

Jesus, the Bible, and Homosexuality describes Rogers' own change of mind and heart on the issue, charts the church's history of using biblical passages to oppress marginalized groups, argues for a Christ-centered

reading of Scripture, debunks stereotypes about people who are LGBT, refutes the conventional wisdom about the texts that are often used against people who are LGBT, and presents ideas for how the church can heal itself and move forward again.

Even if we do not all agree with Rogers' conclusions, hopefully we can all agree that healing is critical. We are in a season for dialogue and discernment. Some may ask about choosing a book to study that presents primarily a shift from the traditional view of heterosexuality only as normative. The reason for the selection of this book is that the biblical viewpoint Rogers presents is less understood by many in the church. Additionally, in order for educated, thoughtful, and faithful conversations, studying a variety of viewpoints provides for deeper understanding and discernment.



Just Eating? Practicing Our Faith at the Table: Readings for Reflection and Action published by the Presbyterian Hunger Program.

This 7-session curriculum explores the relationship between the way we eat and the way we live. The study uses scripture, prayer and stories from the local and global community to explore five key aspects of our relationship with food: the health of our bodies; the challenge of hunger; the health of the earth that provides our food; the ways we use food to extend hospitality and enrich relationships; the opportunities for action, renewal and transformation in our eating practices--as individuals and as faith communities.

Covenant is an in-depth group Bible Study that centers around our relationships with God, with each other, and with the world. It emphasizes the biblical concept of Covenant—the enduring commitment between God and people—as a unifying pattern throughout the entire Bible. It

underscores the unique relationship that God chooses with us as God's people. Three 8-week segments each explore a different aspect of Covenant life. Each will examine what Covenant means, and the progression of a Covenant relationship with God.

Creating the Covenant examines how the Covenant community is created and established. **Living the Covenant** focuses on how the community lives out their Covenant in faithful love—how it's applied to actual relationships in everyday life.

Trusting the Covenant looks at the crises that sometimes call Covenant life into question, and how we are restored to trust in God when troubling things happen.



Revelation and Resistance: Reading the Apocalypse in an Age of Empire

The New Testament book of Revelation remains one of the Bible's most troubling texts. Some read it as a prediction of the Antichrist while others dismiss it as a bizarre historical relic. Many choose not to read it at all! This course will argue that Revelation does in fact have an important message for the contemporary church, but not in the way it is commonly understood. Rather, Revelation presents its readers with a call to resist Empire in all its forms, both ancient and modern, having faith in Christ alone. Beginning with its ancient Roman context, we will explore what that resistance meant in its own time, and what it might mean for us

The Seminary at The Fort is pleased to welcome **Dr. Robert Williamson**, **Jr.**, as our Visiting Scholar for the Fall of 2014. Dr. Williamson is the Margaret Berry Hutton Odyssey Associate Professor of Religious Studies at Hendrix College in Conway, AR. He holds a Ph.D. in Hebrew Bible from



Emory University, as well as a diploma in Jewish Studies from the University of Oxford. A graduate of Columbia Theological Seminary and Clemson University, Dr. Williamson was nurtured in the faith at Fort Hill Presbyterian.
