We have wonderful families busy raising their children within the loving embrace of this church family. What a joy it has been to begin to build relationships with these amazing children and their families. I look forward to deepening relationships with our children and their families as they grow in their faith and God's Love.

As CMC, I have worked with many church volunteers and staff to coordinate a variety of programs and events for our children. Enthusiastic response to participate makes our programs run well. I work with nursery volunteers and paid nursery staff, Sunday Morning Bridge Leaders, Vacation Bible School volunteers and two groups, Children's Ministry Team and Christian Education Ministry, dedicated to education and nurture of our church family. I also help with childcare and recreation during the renewed Wednesday Night activities and dinner.

Through September, total income was \$676,670 while expenses for the first 9 months were \$622,721 for a surplus of \$53,949. Overall expenses are at 67% of budget, while income is at 72.8%. As you can see, income is approximately 2% below budget while expenses are roughly 8% below budget. Session ministry chairs are doing a great job of managing expenses, and thanks to your financial support, Fort Hill is able to continue its ministries to members, community, and around the world.

Bridging Generations Update: Pledge giving for the month was \$50,308.98. Non-pledge giving was \$750, undesignated memorial gifts were \$120 and interest income was \$2.27 for a total of \$51,181.25. Total income year to date is \$681,086.73. Total expenses year to date: \$1,228,483.52.

Report from the 40th Trip for Fort Hill Medical Missions

From September 11—19, 2015, Susan and I were part of an eye surgery team from Georgia working in Comitancillo, Guatemala. This is a town up in the northwest of the country, in the San Marcos state, 8 hours over twisting mountain roads from Guatemala City and about 40 miles from the Mexican border. It is a beautiful Mayan region where many of the people speak only Mam, their regional Mayan dialect. You can image how valuable our helpers were who could speak three languages — Mam, Spanish, and English.

Many of these people are very poor, subsisting on their farms, often perched on steep mountainsides. They come to town to trade their goods for other goods, often not relying on cash. Market days are very busy and we were there during one. Their transportation is whatever might be available, and it would not be unusual to have 15 people standing up in the back of a pickup truck — just crammed tightly together.

In spite of their material poverty, they are incredibly welcoming and friendly, often wanting to hug us before we could even evaluate them. Their smiles were everywhere, and we felt very accepted and sincerely appreciated. And the children are just incredibly beautiful.

Unknown to us before the journey, we arrived during their week of national independence celebration, similar to our July 4. Their special day is September 15, and the celebration lasts all week. This hurt the transportation opportunities for the poorest, and so we were not quite as busy as expected. The great value of this for me was that I had more time to spend in evaluations and examinations. While Susan and others were "locked away" in the OR, I was enjoying the warmth of these people's company. Usually, I have to move quickly along in the examination process so I can get on to the OR, but this time I "specialized" in evaluations, sending the surgery along to others.

Susan once again proved her flexibility as she helped set up the operating room and then became the scrub nurse for Dr. Edgar, a young ophthalmologist from Guatemala City who donated a week of his vacation time so he could join this team. This has to be the way of the future to bring the most help to the people — having a country's own physicians reach out to the poorest. Dr. Edgar plans on donating a free "mission week" every year. Five others from the US completed the team, and we were blessed every day to be with them.

In Guatemala, 60% of the people are Mayan, speaking 22 dialects. From our experiences in Comitancillo and in our previous four trips to El Faro, we cannot say enough about the warmth of these people. They are very accepting and grateful but so often very poor. Charities such as the Efraim Foundation at El Faro and Mission Housing Ministries at Comitancillo are working to bring healthcare, education, housing, and increased opportunities to these fine people who have such a rich heritage. In Comitancillo, we were fortunate to work with Dr. Ovidio Garcia, an optometrist whose mail goal is to improve the lives of his people in a multitude of ways. He is another great example of a caring professional, doing all he can to relieve suffering in his own region, relying on the grace and love of Jesus.

Now, with this completion of Fort Hill Medical Mission's 40th mission effort, we turn our attention to Mission Outreach's 2nd and 3rd. Mission Outreach is the new non-medical arm of Fort Hill's mission efforts. A team led by Chuck Conrad will be working with the Appalachian Service Project in Jonesville, VA, October 11-13. Then a team led by Beth Chapman, will be working in El Faro, Guatemala, from October 19-29. Church and Beth have done supremely well in their leadership roles, and we know that the Fort Hill teams (the El Faro one including Laura Conrad) will be wonderful blessings — and will be greatly blessed themselves.

As a quick summary, you two mission arms are medical (Fort Hill Medical Mission) and non-medical (Mission Outreach). Fort Hill's mission committee welcomes your inquiries and your encouragement and support and is made up of the following members: Mary Barron, Marlene Nicholas, Jim London, Raenota Merrill, Larry Sloan, Cathy Spragins, Bill Beckwith, Chuck Conrad, and Bob Brown. Find out the ways you can be involved in reaching out to the less fortunate.
