In today's world it seems we need to ponder the prophets of old and reflect on Jesus coming into the world rather than fuss about a war on Christmas. We would do well to worship with expectant hears the coming of the Christchild into a world torn apart by violence, greed, and hate. I hope Christians would focus on caring for the needy, serving the lonely, clothing the naked, welcoming the stranger, and loving God through daily and weekly worship. That is what Christmas is about.

Each day our family prays the Moravian blessing which begins, "Come, Lord Jesus, our guest to be and bless these gifts bestowed by thee." May we welcome our Lord Jesus this year like we would our most honored guest. May we welcome his children and one another the same way.

As I prepare to write this last article for 2015, I am in the middle of working with choirs to polish up the notes, rhythms, dynamics, etc. for our Advent and Christmas seasons. Lots of behind the scenes work taking place.

Typing the phrase "behind the scenes" makes me think of many parts of my own life and the life of any church. There are many wheels that have to turn to make all run smoothly. I will go ahead and say up front that I am not trying to name everything I can think of because I would inadvertently omit some, but I am mentioning a few that come to mind.

Mary Morrison, AP Discipleship

In October of 2013, the Reverend Mary Morrison was called to serve as Fort Hill's Associate Pastor for Discipleship. In this role Mary primarily is responsible for coordinating pastoral care, staffing the Deacons, the Christian Education Ministry and the Fellowship Ministry, and preaching, administering the sacraments, and conducting memorial services.

She works closely with the Deacon Executive Committee in their roles of Moderator, Vice Moderator, and Secretary to help oversee, equip, and support the deacons in their many ways of serving the congregation through Compassion, Witness, and Service Ministries. Mary is pleased with the faithful work our deacons provide to members of the congregation, especially in times of challenge, illness, death, and transitions.

In the area of Christian Education, she is charged with helping Fort Hill develop its adult educational/spiritual formation opportunities as well as oversight of the entire CE Ministry providing guidance to the ministry volunteers and working with staff in children's and youth ministries. She has cultivated The Seminary at The Fort with intentional focus on topics of Bible, Theology, Church History, Practices of Faith, and Engagement with the World. Having visiting scholars has added to the depth of study on various issues.

In the area of Fellowship, Mary supports the work of this ministry by encouraging the congregation to participate in cross-generational opportunities. These times connect church families with college students in casual settings to help build relationships beyond the sanctuary on Sunday mornings. Many of the Fellowship Ministry events are focused on children and families, such as Trunk or Treat or Angel Vespers, but all are open to the entire congregation to celebrate what God is doing in our midst.

Mary's days are spent between pastoral care visits, meetings with ministries and leaders, including the Session, reviewing curriculum, teaching Bible studies, dropping in on PW Circles, the Prayer Shawl Ministry, and occasional Circles of Care gatherings and SALT groups. Wherever her ministry of discipleship takes her, Mary most enjoys engaging in life through conversation and serving alongside Fort Hill members.

Currently Mary is also staff liaison to the Associate Pastor Nominating Committee that is searching for an associate to serve with youth and missions ministries. In the interim, Mary mentored Kristyn Ball last year and is staffing the newly formed Youth Ministry Team that grew out of the Youth Architects assessment.

With the renovation project at hand Mary helps to check on the progress of the educational spaces and communicate with teachers and leaders. Mary looks forward to the completion of the project and already can see how the renovated classrooms that we presently can use are making a difference.

Mary's husband Mark joined Fort Hill when she was called here. Mark is active through the choir and serves as a Bridge Builder with the Senior Highs on Sunday mornings. He is also active in a SALT group. Together Mary and Mark have two daughters, Hannah and Sarah. Hannah lives in Charlotte and is working on her masters in teaching at Winthrop. Sarah is a member of Fort Hill and is active in the choir, the young adult ministry, and serves on Session as an elder for the Worship Ministry. Sarah works in regulatory services of the plant industry at the university.

For years the BUC Outdoor Center has been a place where children, youth, college students, and adults have met God in the wilderness of the North Carolina mountains. With reductions in giving to the Foothills Presbytery, the Presbytery voted to have a Commission determine the next steps for the Buc Outdoor Center whether to set up a 501c3 for ongoing mission, place in land conservancy, or to sell the property. Fort Hill Presbyterian Church Mission Team Update El Faro, Guatemala

Saludos!

On Monday, October 19, 2015, the mission team, led by Beth Chapman left before daylight to begin our trip to Guatemala, excited to begin this journey of faith. Beth's team members included Susan and Bob Brown, Marsha Ayers, Laura Conrad, Stacey Miller, Kim Phillips, and Elaine Richardson. When we arrived in San Pedro Sula, Honduras, we boarded a van for a 2.5 hour ride around the mountains to get to the Guatemalan border. Soon after we crossed the border, we were warmly greeted by David Valquez, the director of El Faro. When we arrived in Puerto Barrios, we boarded the boat for the 15 minute ride to El Faro (The Lighthouse). The views were breathtaking and the people so friendly and loving; it felt like we were coming home. We met Tommy and Katie, our missionary leaders and heard their story at dinner. Tommy was in charge of all our projects. After dinner, we attended the Monday evening church service at the El Faro chapel.

We started Tuesday bright and early with breakfast at 7:15 am. Juanita is one of the cooks at El Faro and we were introduced to her that morning as we started the first project, painting her house. We left the compound in 2 trucks loaded with the team and painting supplies. Everyone grabbed a roller or brush and we started the transformation inside and out of the small house with the kitchen structure behine it. We replaced 2 doors that were rotten and 5 windows.

Wednesday morning our project was to build walls around a concrete pad for a kitchen at a village home, so that the old cooking area built from concrete blocks could be dismantled. We picked Wilmer up on the way to the project, to help us. More about Wilmer later. The team got to work and completed the project that day. Before we left, we prayed with Pauline, the homeowner, and asked that God bless her, her family, and her new kitchen. We finished the day back at Juanita's house to touch up paint and hang curtains. Both homeowners were so grateful for the transformation to their houses. After dinner we heard Nelita's (Nellie's) story of her faith journey to El Faro and how she is spreading the gospel, especially with the young girls of Guatemala.

On Thursday morning, we took the boat to Puerto Barrios. We began by visiting the different areas at the children's hospital, spending time in the malnutrition ward, neonatal ward, and the girls' ward. We distributed toys and clothes and spent time loving on and playing with the children. One child in particular touched our hearts. The Guatemalan courts had ordered that Maria be placed in the children's home run by nuns. Her mother is not able to feed her. The baby sister (6 months old, but very tiny) has a heart defect and spina bifida, so she will stay in the hospital. The mother was devastated as expected; Katie (El Faro missionary) and Stacey stayed with the family to comfort and pray for them. We also visited the girls' ward which had 13 patients, many with respiratory problems. Most areas of the hospital had minimal air conditioning, but in this wing it was broken — it was sweltering!

We took a break for lunch and went to the Subway shop in Puerto Barrios mall. While the subs were ordered, Nelita took Beth and Elaine to the grocery store on the other end of the mall. We were purchasing some toy trucks to take to the boys' wing at the hospital. Now Wilmer, who we met the day before, is a little 9 year old boy; he and his family live just outside the gates to El Faro. We had noticed that Wilmer's little croc-like shoes had holes in the soles. We found some in the grocery store and decided to purchase a new pair for him. When Nelita informed us that Wilmer had 7 siblings who all probably needed shoes, we decided to buy enough for each of them.

Tommy and El Faro are preparing a "Ronald McDonald" like space at the hospital. It will be for mothers only to provide a place for them to take a break, get a shower and to sleep. The only option currently is to sit/sleep in the plastic chair beside the bed. In the hallway in the hospital or even on the street. The space was in an existing building that was being used for storage. The afternoon was spent building a wall to separate a sitting space from sleeping area, cleaning up and painting the walls.

Friday morning we went back to the Children's Hospital. We delivered blessing bags to the mothers before visiting the boys' wing and the neonatal area to deliver toys and clothes. Then we went back to our project to paint, clean up the courtyard area and finish the dividing wall. We convinced Tommy that at least one wall needed to be a color and we painted it blue. Beth then painted clouds on it and added "Jesus loves you" in Spanish. The result was a very peaceful calming area for the sleeping room.

Saturday morning we went back to the hospital to work a short while and then headed to the Children's home for a pizza party. We gave out balls, jump ropes and shirts, spent time with the toddlers and infants, and then had a short orange blue soccer game. The children were so loving and fun; the language difference was not a barrier. We did see the little girl from the hospital who had been placed at the home. Sadly these children will most likely not be adopted (Guatemalan government requires that at least one parent be a citizen and the Guatemalans rarely adopt), but it is evident that they are in a loving Christian home.

Sunday was the national election day for Guatemala and we decided to not stray too far from El Faro. We packed up 6 of the stoves and were able to install 5 in homes in the nearby village, including one for Sergio and his family. Sergio is employed by El Faro, and he assisted with most of our projects. The mission team had raised money for over 70 stoves, so it was very rewarding to get to install several of these. At each home, after the installation was complete, a member of the mission team led a prayer of blessing for the family and their new stove. After dinner, missionary John Keehn shared his journey to get to El Faro and how God was using him in Guatemala, especially to work with the men.

On Monday we took the boat to Livingston to visit a church construction site (that El Faro is building) and to deliver water filters with John. All recipients of the water filters were connected to the church, and several of the spouses were working on the construction of the church. At each of the 8 homes, we talked with the families, explained how the water filters worked and prayed with them for their families. It was very rewarding to know that the projects and stoves and filters were being used by the El Faro missionaries to strengthen their relationship with the communities and minister to their spiritual needs. The Monday evening worship service at the El Faro chapel was led by John. At the end of the worship service, each mission team member had an El Faro missionary stand behind him or her and pray for them. This was a very emotional and moving way to close the day.

Tuesday was a planned day of relaxation. Tommy took the mission team on a boat trip; we traveled up the coast by Livingston, up the Rio Dulce and across Lake Izabal to a hot spring water fall. It was BEAUTIFUL!! When we returned, Stacey and Elaine helped Tommy and Bob build the swinging doors for separating the two areas at the hospital project. After dinner, El Faro missionaries, Brittany and Gavin Dozier shared their journey of faith. They are using their talents in sports to minister to the youth of Guatemala.

On Wednesday, our final work day, we returned to the hospital in Puerto Barrios. We built an outside wall for the private sink area and the adjacent courtyard. We made final painting touch ups, adjusted the swinging doors, and stained and shellacked them. The resulting area is a beautiful peaceful spot for mothers of hospitalized children to relax and get some rest. We are excited to see the final result after the bathroom area is complete and the furniture added.

When we returned to El Faro, we delivered shoes, shirts and blessing bags from Wilmer's family. What a precious and loving family! After dinner we were able to purchase handmade items from women and children from the village — items like jewelry made from detailed rolled paper, small and large bags made from beautiful repurposed fabric. We made sure every person there sold at least one item. At the end of our shopping spree, two of the girls (whose families had each received a stove) each prayed for us.

As our time in Guatemala came to a close, each mission team member was feeling very blessed for the opportunity to allow God to use our physical abilities to support the outreach of the missions at El Faro as they share the love and grace of our God with the people of Guatemala. And as we traveled back to South Carolina on Thursday, we realized what a great blessing the experience had been for us. We are grateful to the Fort Hill Presbyterian family for the love, prayers, and financial support.

Deacons Promote Awareness of Ways to Help Caregivers and Others Affected by Alzheimer's/Dementia

Caring for caregivers can be costly, but it does not have to be expensive or complicated. It can be as simple as weeping with those who weep, being there when loneliness threatens to put out the lights of the soul, taking a hand and squeezing it tight. It doesn't take much, just paying attention, taking the initiative and being creative.*

On October 25, the Deacons hosted a speaker, Gail Marion, who gave a presentation on caring for those with Alzheimer's/Dementia. Gail is currently Director of the Rhodes Respite Dementia Care Program at First Presbyterian in Anderson, and her program serves persons with early to moderate-stage dementias in a day program which is designed to provide socialization for patients and respite time for caregivers. Stating that 70% of dementia cases are attributed to Alzheimer's, that aging is the greatest risk factor, and that friends and family members are most often the first to be aware of problems, Gail stressed that early intervention and diagnosis are important for the best treatment options.

Forming a strong support system for the caregivers as well as for those suffering from the disease is crucial. Those attending Gail's presentation received brochures from The Alzheimer's Association (www.alz.org/SC or 800-272-3900) and other handouts; material that described the "seven stages of caregiving" and provided real-life examples of the concerns faced by caregivers as they go about their daily lives. Gail offered a wealth of helpful information and recommended two books, *Learning to Speak* by Joanne Koenig Coste, and *Creating Moments of Joy* by Jolene Brackley. Additionally, Gail offered a list of Caregiver Support Groups that are free and open to anyone caring for a person with Alzheimer's or related dementia. Two such groups close to Fort Hill community are the Oconee Medical Center (every 3rd Friday at 11:30 am; 864-643-8449) whose facilitator is Eunice Lehmacher, and the Corley Activity Center at Clemson Downs (every 1st Wednesday at 2:00 pm; 864-356-1174), whose facilitator is Gail Marion.

For a more complete list of support groups, and to find out more information, contact your deacon. Many deacons have already shared Gail's information with their circle members, and the responses have included such positive feedback as, "Since being with (my mom) over the last three days, I have seen significant, upsetting memory lapses that seem to be dementia. The document you attached was very helpful for me to frame my mind with more listening and patience." It is important to remember that help is available.

There is no more important ministry given to the church. We may not be able to heal the sick as Jesus did, or cast out demons, or raise the dead. But we can walk alongside our friends as they pass through the dark places of life. We can make the inhospitable places more friendly. We can bear one another's burden, and demonstrate decisively that love is strong, stronger even than death.
