## Message From the Pastor

### Come to me . . .

Jesus says, "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

I have seen lots of weary, stressed out people lately, including me! We live busy and demanding lives. And being in a university town, the pace only revs up in the springtime. So I invite you to rest in God. Come spend time with other pilgrims of faith and be in worship, communion, and prayer. The great theologian Augustine wrote, "Our hearts are restless until they rest in You, O God."

The 40 days of Lent is usually seen as a time to deny yourself of something in order to draw closer to God. This year I invite you to add something rather than subtract something. Make worship and daily prayer a priority. We will provide you with a devotional booklet for your daily journey towards the cross and resurrection of Easter. We begin Lent with worship on Ash Wednesday as led by our campus ministry at 7:00 pm on March 1. In addition, each following Wednesday night of Lent from 6:30-7:00 pm we will gather in the Mid-High Youth Room for Evening Prayer. Maundy Thursday, April 13, at 6:30 pm, we will eat together and then worship around tables in Tartan Hall as we share the Lord's Supper.

During our Wednesday Evening Prayer we will enjoy simple worship, conversation, and quiet while experimenting with the worship of the Iona Community in Scotland and the Presbyterian Daily Prayer which you can download as an app "Daily Prayer PC(USA)" for prayer and scripture to read daily morning, noon, evening, and bedtime.

Come rest in God. Hand Jesus your burdens. Learn from Him. Walk with Him as He faces His own death and resurrection. As we die to self we are raised with Him. Thanks be to God!

### Choir Corner

A few weeks ago, Al Masters shared a devotional book from Fourth Presbyterian Church in Chicago featuring hymn texts from familiar hymns in our GLORY TO GOD hymnal. Church members and staff took a different hymn and wrote a devotional and prayer of how the text spoke to them. There were only 12 of them, for the first 12 days of October. (I bet you thought I was going to say the 12 days of Christmas!)

They were poignant, heart felt, and beautiful. So I thought I might share something like that with you. Hymns are close to my heart allowing me to sing my faith. Sometimes they are extremely emotional as God's presence definitely comes through and touches me in a personal way. You may notice tears in my eyes in worship as we sing hymns because I am overwhelmed by our collective singing of our faith. I have no doubt that it is a taste of heaven.

The hymn I would like to share with you is *Love Divine, All Loves Excelling*, #366 in Glory to God. It is a test written by the Methodist leader Charles Wesley in 1747, and the tune is HYFRYDOL, a Welsh tune meaning "delightful".

Verses 2 and 4 are especially close to my heart:

- 2. Breathe, O breathe thy loving Spirit into every troubled breast; let us all in thee inherit; let us find the promised rest. Take away the love of sinning; Alpha and Omega be; end of faith, as its beginning, set our hearts at liberty.
- 4. Finish then thy new creation; pure and spotless let us be; let us see thy great salvation perfectly restored in thee. Changed from glory into glory, till in heaven we take our place, till we cast our crowns before thee, lost in wonder, love, and praise.

How comforting these words are — that the spirit of God would breathe into me when troubled or afraid to give me comfort, strength, and hope! And that God, who is the beginning and the end, will offer me rest and freedom in eternity. And finally to ask that we be complete in God as we leave our earthly home to be lost in wonder, love, and praise in our heavenly home. I am filled with tears and smiling as I type these words of assurance that we will rest in God's arms forever. Amen and Amen.

We post-modern Christ-followers realize that something has changed. Our experience tells us so. Our intuition and feelings tell us so. Yet our understanding of what's happening in congregations, and to congregations, often is the last to learn. The purpose of Shift is to help our understanding catch up with our experience. We need input, insights, information, and examples to make sense of the changes around us. Shift provides this kind of learning for clergy, church staff, and lay persons, long with three hope-filled movements underway.

We as God's Church are Making the Shift into a more robust expression of church. As we do, we are discovering the invigorating way of life to which Christ calls us more fully. This event will invite participants into deeper, more significant ways of being Christ-followers.

Member to Disciple Shift: We will learn about this Shift in self-perception, moving from member to disciple identity, along with what this means for us personally.

### 2017 Deacon's Retreat

On February 18, the Fort Hill Board of Deacons welcomed its Class of 2020, which includes David Cundiff, Nina Moede, Cathy Morton, Cathy McInnis, Marlene Nicholas, Laura Shick, Katherine Sosebee, and Heather Wright. Under the leadership of the Deacon Executive Team, Robin Weeks, Moderator (Class of 2017), Melanie Job, Vice Moderator, Donna Crader, Secretary, and Mary Morrison, Associate Pastor for Discipleship, twenty-four deacons met in the Club Room to fellowship, equip and transition the incoming class members and share ideas for continuing to shape our ministry to be need responsive.

Two years ago, we introduced a new Summary of Structure for the Board of Deacons, with each area of responsibility grouped under the defining ministries of Compassion, Witness, and Service. Through presentation, breakout group discussion, and sharing of ideas we spent much of our morning together, preparing each new deacon to serve effectively in specialized sub-areas of congregational care such as bereavement meals, special receptions, flowers, homebound communion, membership/assimilation, new baby ministry, healthcare and transportation. Did you know that the Board of Deacons has a hand in all of that? Would you like to know more? Would you like to assist? Search out and ask a deacon!

Of course, we spent a lot of our Retreat agenda in conversation about the core of our ministry, our Circle of Care relationships. Each deacon has a specific group of members assigned to his/her care. These groupings are by neighborhoods. While every deacon strives to (1) establish a relationship with each member (or member family); and (2) help each member (or member family) feel connected to the life and ministries of Fort Hill, your involvement is critical to making these relationships true Circles of Care. Who is your Fort Hill deacon? Do you know the other people in your Circle of Care neighborhood? Have you been asked and if so, have you participated when asked to fellowship as a group, and/or pray for or prepare a meal for a neighbor in need? If a crisis occurs, will you feel comfortable contacting your deacon as a representative of Fort Hill who cares? If you cannot answer positively to this list of questions, please give our deacons another chance! Ove the next several days (if not already), you will be hearing from your deacon. This may be a new introduction as we welcome a new class of deacons, or a re-introduction as our 2nd and 3rd year deacons strive to build upon the breadth of their service and depth of their relationships. Their care is continuous and progressive and will be more effective if you all join the circle of neighbors caring for neighbors.

A special time of spiritual inspiration was offered by Mary Morrison as we all shared in Holy Communion, modeling the order of worship and service of elements for an in-home communion service. Are you unable to attend worship on a regular basis due to health constraints? Ask your deacon about adding you to any of our monthly homebound communion services.

Certainly, the Fort Hill Deacons came away from our day-long fellowship together with a renewed sense of purpose and are anxious to show you (as spelled out in the picture below), that FORT HILL DEACONS CARE!


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### One Great Hour of Sharing

On Easter Sunday, April 16, we will be receiving the One Great Hour of Sharing offering. You've heard of OGHS for years, right? Does it just sound like one more time to write a check or put a dollar bill into the offering plate? Well, here are a few facts that might interest you:

- 1. OGHS started after WWII as an effort of the Episcopal Church to raise funds for rebuilding war torn areas of the world.
- 2. In a radio appeal the bishop challenged the church to raise "a million dollars in one hour" for the rebuilding, thus "One Great Hour...".
- Over the years multiple churches have come together to created the Church World Service which coordinates the fund raising and shares in the publicity of OGHS.
- 4. Currently 8 Christian denominations participate in the OGHS but each one determines the recipients of the funds it collects.
- 5. OGHS sends funds to over 80 countries including the US.
- 6. 88 cents on the dollar goes directly to support the projects of OGHS while 6 cents goes to administrative costs and 6 cents to publicity and fund raising efforts.
- 7. In 2014 PCUSA allocated OGHS to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, Presbyterian Hunger Program, and Self-Development of People.
