## **Message From the Pastor**

Yet even now, says the Lord, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning, rend your hearts and not your clothing. — Joel 2:12-13

## **Do Presbyterians Fast?**

As an empty ritual, the short answer is "no"; but as a means of drawing near to God, "yes."

My husband Chuck has been fasting some mornings, intentionally skipping breakfast. Fasting helps the body's metabolism re-set. This allows the digestive system to rest and the body to depend on fat stores. While he is doing this for health and weight, he has learned that he is aware that he has enough to sustain him. He actually feels better.

So maybe fasting in faith is like that, too. We let go of things with which we stuff ourselves or our time to fill emptiness, rather than becoming empty to know the great sustenance of God.

The prophets spoke about fasting, not as following the letter of the Law, but as a means of grace, of drawing near to God. We admit our dependence on God. We confess those things that do not give life — to us or others. Then we repent and change. Fasting is personal, but also communal.

I can think of lots of things from which we can collectively fast as a society. How about our stressful, busy lives? Or our belittling of the poor? Or our addiction to food? Money? Our despising the stranger and foreigner in our midst?

As I write this I am profoundly saddened and weeping for Parkland, FL High School where a 19-year-old massacred 17 people with an AR-15. Now is the time to fast from our idolatry of guns over the safety of human lives: the lives of worshipers, students, concert goers — casualties of a war they did not wage. The prophet Isaiah wrote God's word to us:

<sup>6</sup>Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? <sup>7</sup>Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin? <sup>8</sup>Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you, the glory of the LORD shall be your rear guard. <sup>9</sup>Then you shall call, and the LORD will answer; you shall cry for help, and he will say, Here I am. — Isaiah 58:6-9a

The light seems very dim at times, but I trust Christ is in our midst. The LORD asks us to rend our hearts, draw near to God, call upon the LORD and cry out for help. Live justly and mercifully by acting as God's agents of life-giving love. The Light has come.

Now are we willing to fast from those things that do harm to God's good creation and those who live in it?

## **One Great Hour of Sharing**

One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) is a mission outreach program of PC(USA) providing support for disadvantaged groups, domestically and internationally. Among OGHS priorities are relief assistance for those affected by natural disasters including tropical storms, earthquakes, and drought. Another important program initiative, particularly at this time, is refugee assistance providing food and shelter as well as education for refugee children and resettlement assistance. OGHS supports ongoing food and nutrition programs to those that are hungry and water programs for those without clean drinking water. These initiatives are supplemented with empowerment to help men and women provide for their families beyond immediate crisis periods.

Fort Hill has designated Easter Sunday for its annual offering of One Great Hour of Sharing. If you wish to give to this program in **honor** or **memory** of a loved one, please complete the "Special Offering One Great Hour of Sharing Honor and Remember" form that may be found in the Narthex or FHOG office and return with check payable to Fort Hill Presbyterian Church by March 15. ## **Children's Ministry News**





## David LaMotte is Coming to Fort Hill and Clemson in April

A veteran of 12 CDs and 3,000 concerts in all 50 states and on 5 continents, David LaMotte is an award-winning songwriter, author, public speaker, and the founder of an international non-profit.

LaMotte's music has been honored with numerous awards and grants as well as artist sponsorships from Taylor Guitars and John Pearse Strings. His song *Dark and Deep* was included on *Songs Inspired by Literature, Chapter One.* Other artists on that CD include Bruce Springsteen, Aimee Mann, and Suzanne Vega.

LaMotte is the co-founder and president of *PEG Partners*, a non-profit that supports schools and libraries in Guatemala to improve learning environments there. Because of his strong commitment to peacemaking, he has traveled in several of the world's conflict zones, from Bosnia and Belfast to Hebron and Haiti, promoting intercultural understanding and seeking to learn from people on the front lines of peace work, and has led workshops and trainings in Zambia, El Salvador, Germany, Australia, England, and across the United States.

In 2008, LaMotte suspended his music career to give his focus to his other vocational passion, peacemaking. As a recipient of the prestigious Rotary World Peace Fellowship, he earned a masters degree in International Studies, Peace and Conflict Resolution at Brisbane, Australia's University of Queensland. As part of that fellowship, he also spent three months in rural India working with a Gandhian sustainable development organization.

LaMotte also served as the Clerk (chair) of the American Friends Service Committee's Nobel Peace Prize Nominating Task Group.

As a speaker, he has presented at events across the United States and around the world, including at the Scottish Parliament and the PC(USA) Ministry to the United Nations.

In 2014, he published his most recent book, *Worldchanging 101: Challenging the Myth of Powerlessness*, which is in its second printing, and is being used as a textbook in several U.S. colleges and universities.

LaMotte's new album, *The Other Way Around*. Debuted at #8 on the international Folk-DJ chart, and involves musicians from all over the world.

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## **Sharing the Good News**

Most have heard of the Boy Scouts, but unless you have either been through the Scouting Program or had a child who has, you may not be aware of its positive impact on young lives.

Think of the Cub Scouts as the elementary school introduction to Scouts — geared toward learning new things with a healthy dose of fun. Perhaps you have heard of the Pinewood Derby, where boys work with dads to build a miniature race car. No one is quite sure which generation gets more out of this competition.
