### Reflections on Return-ing to Church

A year ago, I thought we would be back in our routines after a couple of weeks. 54 weeks later, I would never have imagined that we would be here. What I have learned is to trust the process and be patient. I have learned that we can trust those called to serve and lead Christ's church and be His hands and feet in the world. I have learned many things, and one thing I have learned is that we are always in process. When we entitled our plan of action with guidelines as a living document for how to do and be Church, we called it "Return to Church."

What I have learned is that we are Return-ing to Church every day, every week. We ARE the Church, so we never left. Elvis may have left the building, and most of us did, but Christ never left us. We have been Spirit-driven, God-sustained, and Christ-focused. We are returning to what God wants us to be to suit God's purposes.

God is making something new out of us, I believe. Maybe we are a better version of Church now. It may take another year to see how this disaster has changed us. And as with all growth, we have felt the growing pains. Like a teenager whose legs ache and wants to go back to just being a kid, we have wanted to just go back to what is familiar, known. But like the Hebrew children who longed to go back to Egypt of all places as they wandered the wilderness, we realize we have to move forward or get stuck. What we thought was great, may not have been. And maybe we learned more about trusting God who walks with us daily because we certainly did not get a map or GPS for this wilderness.

I hope I am not looking back with rose-colored glasses. We have seen the stress of the pandemic affect groups and individuals. We have unmasked some realities of our world. We see somethings we did not want to see or just were ignorant of like the shortcomings of our mental healthcare system or the presence of white supremacy. We have seen some flaunt public health experts and scientists and witnessed a full-blown mistrust of our institutions. We have seen our violent tendencies as a people on full display. We recall how crazy busy and over-scheduled we were without limits.

But like new shoots from dormant seeds, we see hope and renewal. We are a Resurrection people and Alleluia is our song. So rather than try to resuscitate dead things, in an effort to return to what was, let's see what God will resurrect next! God is return-ing us, reforming and reshaping us, by the power of the Holy Spirit. I have learned to trust God that God's ways are always better than ours.

## Choir Corner

"April showers bring May flowers! Rain, rain, go away, come again another day!" I have always loved these childhood rhymes that we have known and recited in the month of April. There's something to be said for familiar things in our lives. Familiarity makes us comfortable. We are reminded of memories in our lives that made us comfortable or taught us life lessons.

In this past year of a different rhythm to life living in a pandemic, there has been much comfort found in the familiar parts of our lives. And music is a huge part of that. I have found myself humming hymns or anthems that are very familiar – 'earworms' as sweet Pansy Duke taught me! You know – it buries itself in your mind and emerges when you need to hear it most. One of those earworms for me, particularly in the Lenten season, has been Hymn of Promise by Natalie Sleeth. It was featured in our Lenten devotionals for the first week and has been my earworm with its beautiful words of assurance.

I shared this story with some of you. It is one of my favorites because it involved my son Paul when he was in the children's choir that I directed at First Presbyterian in Anderson. (As you parents know, most little boys don't necessarily want to be in the same place with their parents, especially choir!!) There was no choice as far as being present. He had to be there because I was there. I was teaching them the song, Hymn of Promise. Now you have to understand that my son was a good singer, but to have to sing beside your best friend who you competed with in sports was not COOL at all. As we talked about the text and its meaning (I was a stickler for correct pronunciation, etc.), Paul and his friend latched on to a word that they were very good at singing loudly and clearly. It was the only word they sang! The text in the first line of Hymn of Promise says, "In the bulb, there is a flower; in the seed, an apple tree; in COCOONS a hidden promise, butterflies will soon be free." Well, cocoons was their solo word! And it was the right one to enunciate!

I am reminded of the cocoon we have been in this past year. Jesus was in the tomb, but he emerged and came out assuring us of new life and freedom. So as April brings showers of blessings this year, may we fly forth out of our cocoons and into the beauty of spring. Sing your favorite Easter hymn in your heart and mind! May it help you emerge like a butterfly out of its cocoon!!

- The 'TALK' letters stand for the practice actions that one does to help those with thoughts of suicide:

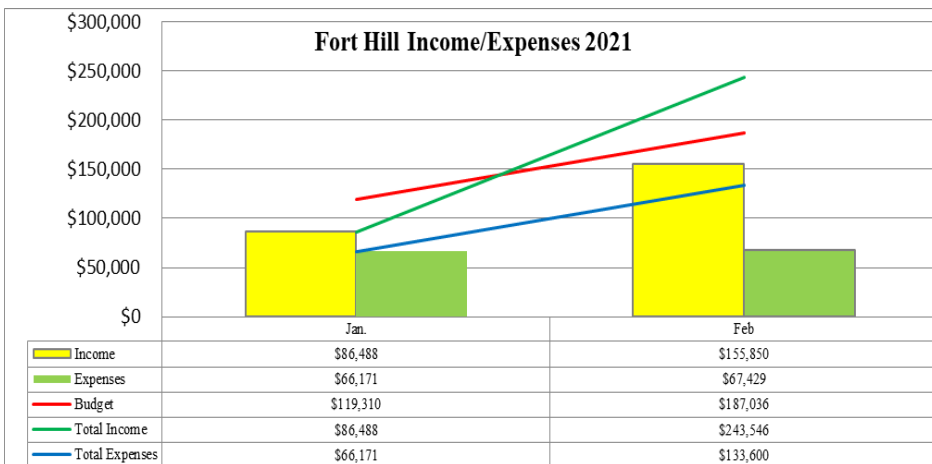

## From the Finance Ministry

**From the Finance Ministry** – Through the first 2 months of 2021, total income was \$243,546 while expenses were \$133,600 for a surplus of \$109,946. Overall expenses are at 13% of budgeted, while income is at 24% of budget. Expenses are slightly below budget while income is above budget. 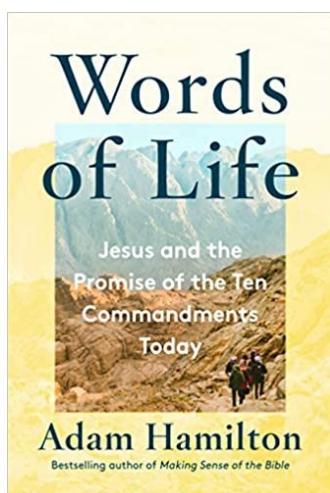
## Words of Life -- Jesus and the Promise of the Ten Commandments Today

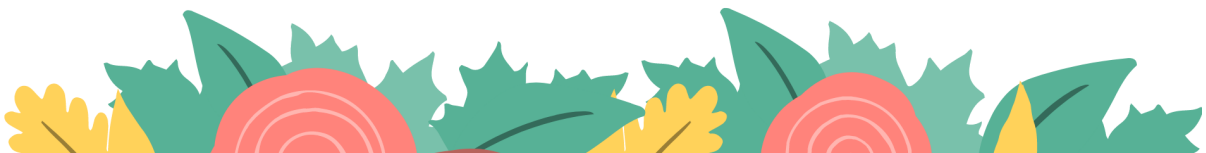
