Make Prayer the Bookends of Your Days

Fort Hill is a praying congregation. Not a week goes by that I have not heard someone speak about the praying people of Fort Hill church. Recently our Prayer Chain Email coordinator, Stephanie Scott, retired from that ministry after

12 years of dedicated service helping to gather the needs of the congregation to share with those who desire to pray. Please extend your appreciation to Stephanie for her faithfulness in keeping us informed of the prayer requests.

As of July 1st we are using emails through our Realm database to share church prayer requests. If you would like to receive these prayer requests to offer words to



God on behalf of others, you can be added to the Realm Group for "Prayer Chain Emails." Simply send an email to communications@forthillchurch.org and request to be added to the group.

If you have a prayer request to share, please communicate it to one of the pastors, by email if possible. That way we can receive clear details for names and what and how to pray. You may also share your requests through your Deacon who can relay it to us as well. We will do our best to convey the prayer requests in a timely manner. Additionally, we trust that if you are sharing a request for a family member that you have also inquired of that person if you may share their request with others.

A word about confidentiality — some persons prefer only a few others to pray for and with them. We want to respect the desires of the disciples in Fort Hill church. We also recognize that praying for those beyond our church family is a kind and gracious act. We ask that before you share such a prayer request that you have been given permission to place their name and need on our church prayer list. You honor the person by getting their permission and we can more confidently share their need for prayer. Sharing prayer requests without permission of the person can cause hurt in relationships. When you share such a request, please let a pastor or your Deacon know that you have also received permission to share it.

I am encouraged by the children in our church who are eager to pray also. I write this during our Vacation Bible School and each day the children have drawn or written or spoken prayers to God that follow this pattern of prayer.

- **P**—Praise God prayers express "I love you, God!" "Thank you, God, for..."
- **R**—Repent prayers help us confess, "I am sorry, God for..." "Forgive me, God, for..."
- **A**—Ask for anyone prayers show "I care for others who need..."
- **Y**—Yourself is the last person to pray for and says "I need your help, God, to..."

So sign up to be on the church Prayer Chain Email and continue to cultivate the gift of prayer in all generations. Please feel free to share your joys as well as your concerns when praying with your church family. We know God loves to celebrate the joys too!

Dive Into and Wrestle with Jesus's Most Difficult Sayings



DIFFICULT WORDS of **IESUS**

A BEGINNER'S GUIDE " HIS MOST PERPLEXING TEACHINGS

For six weeks, spend time with Dr. Amy-Jill Levine and others wrestling with Jesus's sayings that are unlikely to rank high on most lists of "favorite Bible verses." Dr. Levine says, "Ignoring them will not lead to our deeper understanding of and faithfulness to God and Jesus. Engaging them opens that possibility."

lesus provided his disciples teachings for how to follow Torah, God's word; he told them parables to help them discern questions of ethics and human nature; he offered them beatitudes for comfort and encouragement. But sometimes Jesus spoke words that followers then and now have found difficult. He instructs disciples to have members of their own families (Luke 14:26), to act as if they were slaves (Matthew 20:27), and to sell their belongings and give to the poor (Luke 18:22). He restricts his mission (Matthew 10:6); he speaks of damnation (Matthew 8:12); he calls lews the devil's children (John 8:44).

In The Difficult Words of Jesus, Amy-Jill Levine shows how these difficult teachings would have sounded to the people who first heard them, how have they been understood over time, and how we might interpret them in the context of the Gospel of love and reconciliation. Engage these words below with others and discuss how they impact us today.



An Opportunity to Learn About Our Local History and Racism

Join Michael Steele for conversations related to Rhonnda Robinson Thomas' book *Call My Name, Clemson:*Documenting the Black Experience in an American University Community. Participants in the three-week conversation may also plan an additional visit to the site of Woodland Cemetery next to the football stadium. Also known as "Cemetery Hill" the mostly shaded land "has served as the final resting place for some of Clemson's faculty and trustees for nearly a century. Now, researchers have identified more than 600 previously unmarked African American graves, some overbuilt by the marked graves of white people, dating back to the early 1800s." 1



In the July Window, I incorrectly interpreted that our church sits on a portion of the former plantation owed by John C. Calhoun. It was only the "name" of Fort Hill that was received. Further over in the book *Country Church and College Town* on page 30 is the detail that I missed. "On 9 December 1895, the Calhoun Land Company gave to the church for the token price of five dollars one of the company's lots nearest to the college... The property was located roughly one-half mile between the main college building and the town of Calhoun."2 A footnote refers to the Deed of 9 Dec. 1985 [sic], Pickens County Deedbook Q, p. 120, Lot no. 5, Block 80, Pickens County, Pickens, South Carolina, Clerk of Court.

You still have time to register to be a part of this conversation and potential additional excursion to Cemetery Hill with Michael Steele, chairperson of the Inclusion Learning Action Team, who will facilitate the book discussion. Conversations will be on Mondays, August 16, 23, and 30 at 7:00 pm in the church library.








Let's Feed PSA Students Sunday Eves
