Message From the Pastor Epiphany! Stars and Signs

On Sunday, January 7, we will have an Epiphany Breakfast Potluck in Tartan Hall at 9:30. Star words for you to ponder in the year ahead will be available.

At Christmas we recall how Mary and Joseph dealt with unexpected news and challenging timing of a birth and a census requiring travel with a pregnant Mary. And that was just the beginning. When Herod tried to use the intel of the three magi to track down Jesus because he was threatened by him, we know that Mary and Joseph had to flee as refugees to Egypt to save their lives. Even the magi went "home by another way" when they heard

about it, to avoid Herod's treachery. We read in Matthew 2:13-23,

that another angel visits Joseph in a dream to tell him it was safe to return after Herod died. Relief and salvation had come, except that Joseph was warned again that Herod's son was on the throne, and they hid out in Galilee just to be safe.

The early life of Jesus was filled with threats and those who wanted to harm him. What was so dangerous about Jesus? Maybe it was the fact that God's power comes in the humble and vulnerable ways. That was not the way of Herod. A different way seemed to unmask the charade of Herod's violence and capricious rule. Herod was about power <u>over</u>, and Jesus modeled power <u>with</u>. God sent Jesus to be <u>with</u> us. God shares power with us, giving humans the great commandment, and empowers us to be instruments of his truth, grace, and peace. The Herods of this world do not like that.

We call this time of year Epiphany because God is revealed to the light of a star to non-Jews, the magi, to us. Where do you see God at work shining the light of Christ in our world now? Better yet, how are you a vessel who allows God to shine that light in and through you? Through us?

In these days of winter, let us be signs of God's good news and pay attention to the ways God is making all things news.

To review the terms of call and approve any changes for our pastoral staff.

In the Presbyterian Church, there are 6 things the Congregation votes on:

- 1. the election of its officers
- 2. the calling of its pastors
- 3. reviewing the adequacy and approving changes to the Terms of Call for pastors, which includes benefits, salary, housing
- 4. buying, mortgaging, or selling real property
- 5. requesting exemptions to presbytery which are permitted in our Constitution
- 6. approving joint congregational witness; i.e. merging congregations

For those wondering about the title, a Parish Associate is an ordained PC(USA) pastor who is a participant in a congregation, but not serving in an installed pastoral role such as pastor or associate pastor. (Note: Ordained clergy cannot be members of a particular church.) As the Parish Associate at Fort Hill, I am active in the ministries of Fort Hill and available to help and support the pastoral staff.

Living and Loving with Dementia

On Sunday, January 21, the Deacons are sponsoring a churchwide workshop on **Living and Loving with Dementia**. It will be held in Tartan Hall after the 10:45 am worship service. This workshop is designed with all adults, caregivers, and friends in mind.

As adults, chances are that we know several older adults who are living with dementia and one can often wonder, "What if that was me?" Come with your questions and open minds to learn about the signs of dementia — What is dementia? What is Alzheimer's? What can you do if you know a loved one who struggles with forgetting on a regular basis? What questions do you have?

This workshop is designed with caregivers in mind to help provide understanding about the disease of memory loss. Learning about tools to cope with dementia or ways to support those who find themselves experiencing short-term memory loss will also be shared. What does it mean to be a caregiver of someone with dementia? How can I take better care of myself to care for the one I love? How does dementia impact one's family and daily life?

This workshop is designed with friends in mind to help those they love, as well as to help caregivers address compassion fatigue. Come to learn the following: Where are resources and support groups within my own community that can support my loved one and me? What are ways my deacon can support my loved one and me as we experience this life transition?

Helping us to answer these questions and more will be Anna Hatcher, Memory Care Director at the Foothills Retirement Community in Easley. Anna is a native of Easley, South Carolina. She has served the Foothills Community for over nine years and most recently began serving as a mentor for Presbyterian Communities of South Carolina to help implement

the Montessori Approach to Aging and Dementia across all their communities. In addition to her higher education, she is a Certified Dementia Practitioner and Certified Montessori Elder Care Practitioner. She is passionate about caring for and training people to care for people with dementia and feels that helping people understand them is her life's calling.

The workshop program will begin around 11:50 am in Tartan Hall and provide time for presentation as well as Q&A. Snacks and water will be provided. If you are able to be a sitter so that a caregiver can attend this workshop without worry for their loved one, please contact Mary Morrison at mary.morrison@forthillchurch.org.

Back by Popular Demand, Sandra Smith and the Ennegram Subtypes

You may know your Enneagram type, but do you know your subtype? If you do not know your type, then learning about the 27 subtypes can help you better discern your type. There are subtle nuances in the subtypes that can point one to their niche on the Enneagram.

Join Narrative Tradition Enneagram certified consultant and teacher Sandra Smith on Saturday, January 27, from 9:00 am — 4:00 pm as she guides participants through exploration of the Enneagram's 27 subtypes that drive personality. A certified Enneagram teacher since 2002 and a consultant since 2008, Sandra works daily with the nine Enneagram types, whether in corporate settings, nonprofits, or in Spiritual Direction. She says, "I've had the privilege of witnessing the subtle and not so subtle nuances of each of the types."

This January 27th workshop offers material that deepens our knowledge of the Enneagram as we explore the three specific instinctual drives that influence our type. When these instincts get co-opted by the type, we refer to them as subtypes.

the instinctual energy of *surviving* or **self-preservation** the instinctual energy of *belonging* or **social** the instinctual energy of *connecting* or **sexual (one to one)**

We have all three of these drives and one tends to be dominant. **This most used instinctual energy is an arena** of our strengths as well as our neurotic grasping. During our time together we'll discuss *the three dimensions of each of these three subtypes*, then address strategies for calming our grasping and **balancing** the three drives. Many teachers believe that the subtypes play a central role in intimate relationships, perhaps more so than our Enneagram type.

These subtypes give the personality a particular look. Thus, two people who share the same Enneagram type may behave quite differently. Our Enneagram type reveals how we perceive our environment, receive and process information. Subtypes are about output — how and where we expend our life's energy. Understanding our subtype energies is central to our personal growth and self-awareness and frees up energy that is overused in one subtype area.



Sandra believes that "We bring our uniqueness to our Enneagram type, so it isn't a 'cookie cutter' system. We humans are full of mystery so we remain open to surprise with ourselves and each other."

"The transforming work of shifting judgement to curiosity and reaction to compassion can occur when we understand that there are nine unique perspectives, nine filters for seeing reality and taking in information. And, once we understand the inner workings of the nine types, then we realize that the only appropriate response is compassion. This internal diversity system is fascinating and the learning is never ending. Join me on the path to greater compassion and constant curiosity!"

Identify. Understand. Respond. Register for Mental Health First Aid Training

Fort Hill deacons serving on the Mental Health Awareness & Training Team are offering two Mental Health First Aid training events for the congregation and community. This is basic training that teaches adult participants about mental health and substance-use issues.

A national program, Mental Health First Aid is a skills-based training course and has trained more than 3 million people across the country to identify, understand, and respond to signs and symptoms of mental health and substance use challenges.



Fort Hill Presbyterian Church is excited to partner with MHFA and provide training for pastors, educators, youth leaders, elders, deacons, and congregational and community volunteers. Two courses are being offered.

- 1. **Adult Mental Health First Aid** on Saturday, January 27, from 9:00 am—4:00 pm in the Den. Adult Mental Health First Aid teaches adult learners how to assist fellow adults.
- 2. **Youth Mental Health First Aid** on Saturday, February 24, from 9:00 am—4:00 pm in the Den. Youth Mental First Aid teaches adult learners how to assist adolescents between the ages of 12 and 18.

NATIONAL COUNCIL for Mental Wellbeing®

Just as CPR training helps a person with no clinical training assist an individual following a heart attack, Mental Health First Aid training helps a person assist someone experiencing a mental health crisis such as contemplating suicide. In both situations, the goal is to help support an individual until appropriate professional help arrives.

HEALTHY MINDS = STRONG COMMUNITIES

Mental Health First Aiders learn a single 5-step action plan known as ALGEE, which includes

assessing risk, respectfully listening to and supporting the individual in crisis, and identifying appropriate professional help and other support. Participants are also introduced to risk factors and warning signs for mental health or substance use problems, engage in experiential activities that build understanding of the impact of illness on individuals and families, and learn about evidence-supported treatment and self-help strategies.

Register today for one of the upcoming MHFA training courses! Lunch is provided free! Limit to 30 persons each training session.

<u>Fliers</u> are available in the church office and may be shared in the community. Completion of a course certifies participants for 3 years.


