Bethlehem with expectation. From the authors of A Sanctified Art:

Christ was born into a weary world. King Herod ruled the land with a legacy of ruthlessness. The Romans treated the people of Israel with contempt, imposing harsh taxes and land seizures that forced many into subsistence farming. Poverty and destitution were pervasive. And yet, Christ was born, bringing good news of great joy for all people.

As Advent comes again to a weary world, we ask, "How does a weary world rejoice?" From the opening chapters of Luke's Gospel, we have found a few answers: we acknowledge our weariness, we find joy in connection, we allow ourselves to be amazed, we sing stories of hope, we make room, we root ourselves in ritual, and most importantly, we trust our belovedness. In the parallel birth stories, we find rhythms for rejoicing. As we move through our series, we hope to create space for acknowledging the weariness of our world while celebrating God's closeness with great joy.

And so, this Advent, we will hold space for our weariness and our joy. We will see a "thrill of hope" in our hurting world. We will welcome joy — even if, like the prophet Isaiah, we cry out for comfort (Isaiah 40:1). In this weary world, may we find many ways to rejoice.

May all the blessings of God: hope, peace, love, and joy be yours this season.

Blue Christmas? What is that?

Blue Christmas is a gentle reflective service of hope for the hurting. Our Blue Christmas will be on the longest night, the winter solstice which is December 21st this year. While this service is designed to bring comfort to those who are grieving or missing someone or something in their lives that is now gone, the reality is that people who are hurting are not likely to come to such a service unless someone they trust brings them or invites them to come and sit with them.

Think now about who you will invite, pick up, and bring with you to sit together to acknowledge the "blues" that can often accompany the holiday fanfare.

Our world has much going on that we can think of that is not pleasant - the ongoing war in Ukraine, the newer war between Israel and Hamas, the challenges to democracy, just to name a few. But there are also very personal losses that can cause us to be blue at Christmas. Losses that pierce our hearts when a loved one has died, when a cancer diagnosis has been spoken, when a class has been failed, when employment has been reduced, when a dream has been crushed, when a marriage has fallen apart, when a young adult overdoses, when a partner lies to cover up an affair, when the treatments are no longer helping, when the season is over, and the list goes on. So why do we try to cover our pain and grief with Yuletide cheer?

If this is you or someone you know, come and sit with one another in a liturgy that speaks of the love of God for the grieving. We will share Scripture readings, prayers that acknowledge pain and emptiness as well as Christian hope, reflect on light in darkness as we light the candles of the advent wreath using darker themes of death, judgment, heaven, and hell, experience silence, and light individual candles at the crib. In a dark and weary world, come let your sadness and that of others be welcomed, but met with the light of hope.

Internal Coaching at Fort Hill

During the pandemic years without the ability to attend in-person conferences, I pursued my continuing education with a focus on gaining coaching skills, knowledge, and practice. I am one of five who are the first persons to become a Certified Life Coach through Summit Coaching Training. As my role at Fort Hill changes, I requested that I be allowed to serve as an internal coach through one-on-one opportunities with church members as well as in some group settings.

I will offer internal coaching through the church. If you have a decision to make that you want someone to help you think through, a coach is an excellent way to do that. Coaching is a creative process in which the client talks about a professional or personal challenge and together with the coach listens, questions, and discerns the possibilities to empower the client to change and grow by acting upon his or her own decisions to improve one's quality of life.

I will coach formally and with church members who may desire more engagement into planning ahead for something, such as a life transition like a move to an independent living or assisted living facility, looking for a new job, moving to a new place, or any number of work or life experiences. I will meet with you for a series of coaching sessions, agreed upon by you, the client, and me. Coaching will help you claim your own strengths, gain personal and professional insights, improve your performance and satisfaction, become more balanced, grow with an accountability partner, and achieve your personal goals as you tackle your challenges.

As I coach internally at Fort Hill, I will describe the protocols that establish the coaching relationship, what a typical coaching session looks like, share the International Coaching Federation Code of Ethics with you, and schedule three to seven coaching sessions. Confidentiality is key to a healthy coach-client relationship and that would be maintained within my role as an internal coach at Fort Hill. As a pastor, I hold confidentiality in high value.

One of the services provided through Pinnacle Leadership Associates, Summit Coaching Training began during those same pandemic years and is now accredited by the International Coaching Federation, the premier accrediting body of all things coaching for professional coaches worldwide.

My goal is to gain ICF certification as an Associate Certified Coach (ACC) which requires 60 hours of coach specific education (I have 64 now) and 100 hours of client coaching experience. I have completed my 25 hours pro bono and am working on my 75 hours paid. The gift of internal coaching is just that. A gift to the congregation because as an internal coach, it is considered as part of my call, and I can count those hours as paid hours.

I also have coaching clients outside the church and count those hours among my client coaching experience which provides supplemental income. Additionally, I believe coaching is dovetailing with my sense of call to respond to the local mental health crisis identified by the church.


From the Finance Ministry

Through October, pledge and offering income was \$995,227 while expenses for the first 10 months were \$904,533 for a
