Message From the Pastor Which Jesus Do We Worship and Serve?

Perhaps you have read the testimonies of pastors who have been vilified and demonized for preaching the teachings of Jesus like the Beatitudes (Luke 6:20-26, Matthew 5:1-12). For some people, that Jesus does not line up with their ideologies. Like Jesus, these pastors have been run out of town and thrown off a proverbial cliff for preaching the gospel (read Luke 4:16-30, the Rejection of Jesus). But the Jesus revealed to us in the gospels is:

- the one who touched the hand of the leper,
- the one who fed a starving hillside multitude,
- the one who said our neighbors and enemies deserve the same love we give our families and ourselves,
- the one who preached the scandalous worth of a despised Samaritan,
- the one who said he and the forgotten prisoner on the cross were one in the same,
- the one who dined with both priest and with prostitute,
- the one who spoke to and really saw the woman at the well,
- the one whose family fled political genocide soon after he was born.

Perhaps we have gotten confused because we are listening to the wrong teachers, looking to the wrong leaders. Whatever heresy of Christian Nationalism, prosperity gospel, or fertility religions we see throughout history, the people of God, the Church, always need reforming by the Word of God and the work of the Holy Spirit. We believe in sin. Maybe we have forgotten the gift of self-reflection, truth telling, and confession as a discipline in society. Since we predestined to be conformed to the image of Christ (Romans 8:29), we all fall short. As we celebrate the Reformation of the church which resulted in the Protestant tradition on Sunday, October 27, I think Russell Moore has it right when he writes,

The way forward is what it's always been. As Luther said in his Heidelberg Disputation, 'The theologian of glory calls evil good and good evil. The theologian of the cross calls a thing what it is.' Sometimes that means nailing a word or two to the castle door. Sometimes that might mean letting goods and kindred go. The whole of Christian life is about repentance. That repentance must be about the renewing of our minds and the renovation of our hearts, not just the laundering of consciences that are no longer bound to the Word of God.¹

We all have work to do! Let us choose to take up a cross and follow Jesus, the Word made flesh, not the Jesus we remake in our own image.




From the Finance Ministry

Through August, total income was \$788, 350 while expenses for the first eight months were \$738,976 providing a surplus of \$49, 371. Overall expenses are at 62% of budget, while income is at 68%. As you can see, expenses are approximately 4% below budget and income is roughly 2% above budget. Thanks to your financial support, Fort Hill Church is able to continue its ministries to members, community, and around the world. **Thank you!** If you are not present at church, your contributions can be made by mail or online through the Fort Hill website or your Realm profile account.

Bridging Generations Update:

Through the end of August, total income was \$217,515.12. We spent \$180,000 of those funds to pay off the Building

Fund loan with the final payment made in June. The balance and additional money received will be used for projects with include replacing the sanctuary 33-year-old lighting system and updating the sound technology for inperson and on-line worship. Another project is the development of the outdoor space in the "backyard" that all ministries of the church can use to support their specific activities.

Preschool is back and Sunday School is starting back too!! I love all the activity and of course all the crumbs that are left behind.



Brandon's favorite PSA memory is the Charleston mission trip from the packed car rides around the city to late nights filled with card games to picking strawberries in the s sun, "we had a blast." His advice to freshmen regarding PSA? "Go eat non-dining hall food! It can be tough to peel yourself away from your friends, homework, or bed on a Sunday evening, but why not go get some good, free food. Worst case scenario, everyone you meet is too friendly and not your style, but you got a free meal. Best case scenario you make amazing new friends." He recognizes that post-COVID PSA has struggled but regardless of size, its mission is being carried out. And with the growth they have seen recently, they are becoming more and more active in the campus community.
